COMMON CONCERNS IN CONNECTICUT

Coastal: Flooding, coastal erosion, sea level rise, storm surge, hurricanes, extreme temperatures. Urban: Urban heat island, severe thunderstorms (storm water), flooding, extreme temperatures. Rural: Wildfire, drought, extreme temperatures. Suburban: Hurricanes, wind damage, flooding, severe winter storms, extreme temperatures.
